

'First Omicron Death an Anti-Vaxxer' Story Falls Apart

## **Description**

Podcast king Joe Rogan and his guest, surfer Shane Dorian, pointed out the environmental damage that face masks will have, while simultaneously highlighting that the face coverings do little or nothing to prevent the spread of COVID.
