

US Has Been Supporting Ukraine With 'Offensive' Cyber Operations

Description

USA/RUSSIA: Gen. Paul Nakasone, the head of US Cyber Command, told *Sky News* on Wednesday that the US has been conducting "offensive" cyber operations to support Ukraine in its war against Russia.

Nakasone said the US has "conducted a series of operations across the full spectrum; offensive, defensive, information operations." He didn't share any details of the cyber operations, but his disclosure is the first time a US official has admitted to launching cyberattacks to support Ukraine in the war.

NATO has stepped up cyber cooperation with Ukraine in recent months by allowing <u>Kyiv to join its</u> <u>cyber defense center</u>, known as the Cooperative Cyber Defence Centre of Excellence (CCDCOE). On Monday, <u>Ukrainian officials met with the CCDCOE steering committee</u> for the first time.

Nakasone's disclosure is the latest example of US support for Ukraine that risks provoking Moscow. After Russia invaded, President Biden <u>Warned that a Russian cyberattack was "coming,"</u> but so it never materialized.

In recent years, US and NATO officials have signaled they believe cyberattacks could potentially start a war. A few days after Russia invaded Ukraine, <u>a NATO official told *Reuters*</u> that a cyberattack on an alliance member could trigger Article 5 collective defense clause, which states an attack on one member is an attack on all.

Last year, President Biden said that he believes the US <u>could end up in a "real shooting war"</u> with another power over a cyberattack. "If we end up in a war, a real shooting war with a major power, it's going to be as a consequence of a cyber breach of great consequence," he said.
